Latin Cross & The Ankh

The ancients show the top part of the Ankh as the Shen ring. This ring is shown in both Egypt and Sumeria as belonging to the Gods.



The Ankh is where the Latin cross comes from. The two bars of the Latin cross are the temple chakras shown connecting into the third eye in Hinduism. The top part of the Ankh, the Shen, is also what forms the hieroglyph of the Egyptian and Phoenician letter Shin. In Kabbalah the Shin letter is shown placed into the upper face which is the brain. This was stolen from the Egyptians, the Shin is simply the mantra relating to opening the third eye and crown. Shin is also in the east as the same mantra.

The Ankh is the symbol of the world tree in ancient Egypt, which is what the Latin cross is as well.

The Ankh's vertical line that connects to the Shen is called the VA in Egyptian. In Kabbalah the Vau letter is the secret name of all the 32 paths on the world tree. It's called Vauel but the EL just means "god", it is Vau.

The Vau letter is shown to look like the spine and head together in kabala.

In the Templar's Grail Mythos, the spear that regenerates the soul is called the Vaul. The spine is the shaft and the head of the spear is the connection into the brain to the optic thalamus. Which the Egyptians show as the eye of Wadjet, which means "The Serpent VA".

The VA is also shown as the hieroglyph of the risen cobra, which in Kundalini Yoga is the symbol of the spine, the dual hemispheres of the brain, and the risen

energy. This is why the Vau is called "The Holy Serpent" in kabala. It connects the energy through all of the spine. The kabbalah calls this the shaft of light and mentions that it draws the leviathan up to the heavens. Leviathan was the name of the seven headed sea serpent in Sumeria its the serpent energy. The Jews even stole the name from somewhere else. Each of the seven heads is one of the chakras that form the world tree.

The Ankh was also shown with the Vas Specter upon it and the Djedi pillar as the vertical shaft. These are the symbols of the spinal column in ancient Egypt. Note Djedi means Serpent. The Ankh is also the symbol of the serpent planet of Venus which turns to the left as a planet, the direction which represents the serpent energy. Vasu is the name of Venus in Sanskrit and a title of Vishnu. The name of the flute of Krishna which represents the spinal column and the serpent energy is Vamsa Venu. Venu...s. The serpent energy is the spinal column. Krishna is Vishnu. The Ankh is the serpent energy flowing through the spine and brain. Vama is the name of the serpent God in Hinduism this is where the Jews stole the Vau, their "Holy Serpent", from. Vama's bija mantra is Vaum which is also spelled Vau in Sanskrit in the spellings without the anusvara on the end.

The other name for the 32 paths on the Kabbalah world tree is that of LEV, stolen from VEL, the name of Muruga's spear in Hinduism, holding the same meaning as mentioned previously. Muruga's yantra is the six pointed star which shows the upper female and lower male chakras on the world tree meeting at the heart. The Trinity in Hinduism is Brahma, Shiva, and Vishnu, but each God has a corresponding Goddess. The three Goddesses are Saraswati, Lakshmi and Durga. The lower three male chakras or Gods, and their pairs being the upper three female Goddesses, the female chakras. The Kabbalah states that male Gods and female Goddesses live in the Kabbalistic world as the female and male sphere's or worlds on the tree, and that they sexually unite to create the new soul. This was all stolen from Hinduism and Egypt. Ancient Egypt was a Vedic civilization.

The lower vertical shaft of the Ankh is the lower face in kabbalah, being the seven major chakras, and the upper face is the Shen or Shin. This was all stolen from the Egyptians.

Note Enki is actually spelled Anki, he is the serpent on the tree in Sumeria. Anki was also called Satan by the ancient Chaldeans. Anki is the name Ankh comes from. Satan is the name of the serpent spirit in Egypt, which is represented by Venus. Satan is also the name of the element of spirit in Sanskrit, the highest God, and this is represented by Venus in Hinduism and shown as the serpent.
